Reflections from the Rector

From the holy feast of Easter until Pentecost, "Alleluia" is always said with both the Psalms and the responsories. Every night from Pentecost until the beginning of Lent, it is said only with the last six Psalms of Vigils.

Benedict of Nursia - 5th Century A.D.

As the glorious Easter season continues, I am reminded of a section in a book by Joan Chittister, [The Rule of Benedict - Insights for the Ages](#). Following is an excerpt from this book that speaks to the emotion and joy expressed in our fresh new cry of Alleluia .

The Navahos wrote, "We felt like talking to the ground, we loved it so." Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, "The earth laughs in flowers." Benedict of Nursia wrote, "Say Alleluia always, no matter the time of day, no matter the season of life.

The use of the Alleluia dates back to the earliest of liturgical formularies, both Jewish and Christian, as an endless chant of joy. In the Christian community it was an expression of praise and a foretaste of eternal gladness.

"We are an Easter people," Augustine wrote, "and Alleluia is our cry."

Benedict of Nursia did not originate the use of the Alleluia but one thing he did was to extend its use to every day of the year except during Lent.

The prescription is a telling one. To the Benedictine mind, life in all its long nights and weary days is something to be praised. Death is the rivet of joy, there is no end to the positive. Even life in hot fields and drab offices and small houses is somehow one long happy thought when God is its center, and blessings, however rare, however scant, are blessed.

Sometimes in every generation, we find ourselves at the brink, wondering if God and the spiritual life have lost their relevance. Such notions might come when we perceive a disconnect between the technological marvels of our time and the ancient stories that come to

us via our faith tradition. Such notions may be the result of a life experience devoid of hope and an emptiness of love. Such notions may be a response to a world where calamity and chaos seem to rule the day and peace & goodwill are impossibilities. Such notions may come from one's own sense of self worth and an understanding that he or she has accomplished all things by virtue of their intellect and skill. In all of these notions of life and being, there is the potential that God and the spiritual life will be abandoned.

The simple act of writing the words in that last paragraph, stirs deep sadness within me. Now read again the excerpt from Joan Chittister's book, especially her last paragraph. Our faith, our spiritual life is not happy-clappy joy alienated from the realities of "long nights and weary days". There is instead a deep rooted joy, capable of bearing the sometimes harsh realities of life. I'm convinced that this is what the Easter season is all about. Even the stories of the Passion and Resurrection remind us that our faith and spiritual joy can bear the burdens of life and culminate in new beginnings. The question, for those, like me who say such things, is then, "Do we really believe this and do we live as if we believe this?". Such living draws us into relationship with others, perhaps even others who have given up on the notion of God. Then in some mysterious way, with God's help, our willingness to live in such a manner, becomes a life blessing for all. Those first apostles, intimately equipped for this manner of living, discovered this. Disciples in every generation have been equipped for this manner of living and have discovered this. Even in this 21st century, we who have been stirred by the stories of scripture, tradition, reason, and experience are discovering the spirit & will to live in this manner.

The only way God and the spiritual life can lose their relevance is if the people of faith in that generation lose their will to live as Easter people. Even then, I am convinced the rocks and stones would begin to sing, "Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia" and some simple person in some ordinary place would respond, "I wonder if there is more to this life than I am experiencing?". The dry bones of the spiritual life will then be covered with sinew and flesh and the dance of a new beginning between the human and divine will blossom and flourish once again.

Be blessed and share the blessing of God's love, in this Easter season and always.

The altar was beautiful, almost overwhelmed with Easter lilies, whose light fragrance drifted through the church. The cross at the steps to the altar was covered with flowers placed there by the children attending the services. This year's Easter Sunday Services were very well attended, as usual. The 10:30 service was nearly standing room only. And as usual, lots of people said "Why can't we have this kind of attendance all of the time?" To be fair, a lot of the attendees were from out of town, either visiting relatives or on a short vacation. So, we can't expect to see them all of the time. There are some who were there that probably feel that attending the "high spots" of the church year, such as Christmas Eve and Easter Sunday are enough church for them. Others feel that they can communicate with God on their own and do not need to be in church to do that.

First, let me say that I certainly am not trying to judge anyone. It is my personal choice to be in church on more Sundays than Easter Sunday, but in my ongoing journey of faith, I have probably, at one time or another, fit into all of the above categories and then some. Regarding the need not to go to church to talk to God interests me because I have several friends who tell me that is their belief. Looking in the bible, one can find various scriptures that address this issue. "Again, I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about anything you ask for, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. (Mathew 18:19)" This certainly supports praying with others. However, praying alone is instructed in "But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you". (Mathew 6:6). "Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you" (James 4:8).

So, is it o.k. to pray alone? I think it is, just as it is o.k. to pray with others. I think the key is the spirit in which the prayers are offered. So, maybe my friends are at least biblically correct in their stance that they do not need a church to commune with God. But, I maintain that they are missing out on so many things spiritual by not going to church.

My friend Lynn Lee sent me the following one day via email.

THE SILENT SERMON

A member of a certain church, who previously had been attending services regularly, stopped going. After a few weeks, the pastor decided to visit him.

It was a chilly evening. The pastor found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for his pastor's visit, the man welcomed him, led him to a comfortable chair near the fireplace and waited.

The pastor made himself at home but said nothing. In the grave silence, he contemplated the dance of the flames around the burning logs. After some minutes, the pastor took the fire tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember and placed it to one side of the hearth all alone then he sat back in his chair, still silent.

The host watched all this in quiet contemplation. As the one lone ember's flame flickered and diminished, there was a momentary glow and then its fire was no more. Soon it was cold and dead.

Not a word had been spoken since the initial greeting. The pastor glanced at his watch and realized it was time to leave. He slowly stood up, picked up the cold, dead ember and placed it back in the middle of the fire. Immediately it began to glow, once more with the light and warmth of the burning coals around it.

As the pastor reached the door to leave, his host said with a tear running down his cheek, 'Thank you so much for your visit and especially for the fiery sermon. I will be back in church next Sunday!'

We live in a world today, which tries to say too much with too little. Consequently, few listen. Sometimes the best sermons are the ones left unspoken.

Now, let me say that I'm **not advocating** Father Jim stop preaching sermons. What I got out of this story was that as soon as we, as Christians, lose some of our "fire" if we stop going to church. That fire can be rekindled if we go back.

I receive so much inspiration from members of our congregation. They certainly "walk the walk" when it comes to living a Christian life. Father Jim continually provides a spiritual compass for me. Our choir brings me closer to God with every hymn. The prayer chain that circulates asking for prayers for the sick and ailing is a blessing. The outreach programs that our members donate countless hours to are a source of hope and dignity to our neighbors who are less fortunate. The fellowship that we all share at our meetings and dinners is priceless. I can't imagine not going to church and not being a part of all of this. And I know that those who don't go to our church would bring many blessings to our congregation if they would come. The church is a support system like no other. I hope more will discover that. You and I can help them. Bring a friend to church next Sunday.

Memorial Day 2010

Memorial Day will be celebrated on Sunday, May 30 at the 10:30 service. The plan is to remember those in our extended St. Peter's family who have died in military service. If you have family or know of someone that you want to be remembered, please pass the name or names to the church office or to Jim Reed.

Memorial Day was originally called Decoration Day and was celebrated by the veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic to honor Union soldiers who died in the Civil War. It was inspired by the manner in which the people of the Southern States honored their Confederate dead. After World War One, the celebration was extended to include all the men and women who died in any war or military action. After World War Two the name Decoration Day was changed to Memorial Day. Traditionally the flag is flown at half staff from dawn till noon and the day is set aside to honor all who have died in military service.

If you have names to be included it would be very appropriate to include the name of the Service;
for example, "John Albert Jones - United States Army".

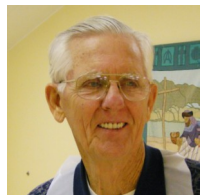

GOOD SAMARITANS - MAY 2010

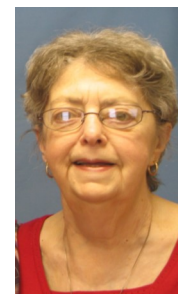

Mother's Day Offering - Sunday, May 9th, 2010

2010 marks the 10th year that the Diocese of West Texas has celebrated Mother's Day with a special offering honoring our mothers and women who have influenced our lives in a special way. The funds that are raised through the Mother's Day Offering benefit children who are abandoned, neglected and orphaned; children who are hungry, sick and in need of help for their education. The funds help women who are trapped in poverty create a better home for their families.

In the past ten years, the people of West Texas have donated approximately \$200,000 through the Mother's Day Offering and have blessed so many people with their gifts.

In 2009, seventeen grants were made. All the grant requests came from our diocesan missionary team leaders and from our missionary partners around the world.

The grants totaling \$18,085 were:

1. Food packets and soap for 100 families in Honduras who lost their crops in a drought.
2. A wheel chair for a crippled girl in Honduras.
3. Scholarship for a dental student who works with our teams in Honduras.
4. Supplies for "The Isle of Hope" day care center for handicapped children in Belarus.
5. School supplies for a Medical/Dental team working with children in Honduras.
6. School fees for orphans at "La Gran Familia" orphanage in Cuauhtemoc, Mexico.
 7. Educational DVD sets for orphans in Karimnagar, India.
 8. Construction of closets in a girl's dorm in an orphanage in Kenya.
 9. 100 New Testaments, Psalms and Proverbs for Christians in Iran.
 10. Construction of a playground in a village in Honduras.
 11. Scholarship for a university student in Uganda.
 12. School supplies for a veterinarian team's ministry in Honduras.
 13. Scholarships for children in a program in Southeast Mexico.
14. Vitamins, equipment and repairs for "Casa de los Angeles" orphanage in San Miguel.
15. Supplies and carpet for a day care center at "La Gran Familia" orphanage, Mexico.
 16. Funds to buy a car for a missionary family in Israel.
 17. Funds to underwrite a bishop wives' conference in Uganda.

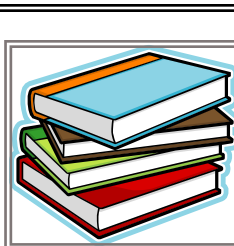
