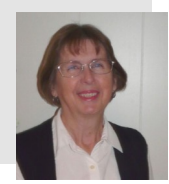

Shown below is a summary of the Church operating accounts for the seven months ending July 31, 2011.

Revenue	\$198,701	\$190,730	\$7,971
Expense	<u>158,447</u>	<u>187,138</u>	<u>28,691</u>
Net Revenue/ Expense	<u>\$40,254</u>	<u>\$3,592</u>	<u>\$36,662</u>

As the above table shows, the Church's actual results for the seven months is \$36,662 better than planned.

Cash and short term investments of St. Peter's totaled \$251,678 on July 31, 2011. These balances are in addition to the funds dedicated to the Building, Memorial, Columbarium and RDF accounts.

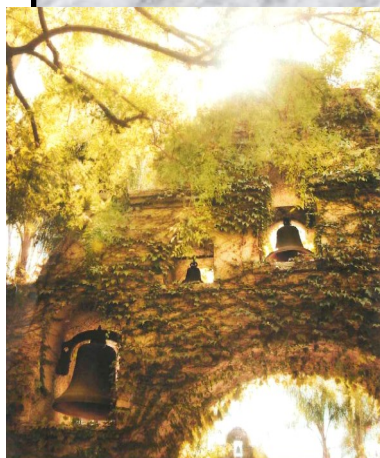
not have to be there for a particular class or program, she was just following Jesus's message to us to serve one another.

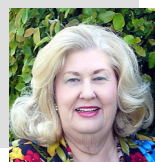
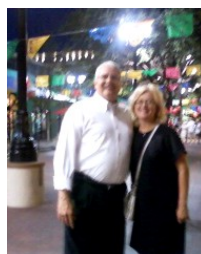
The congregation consisted not only of many visitors, but also hundreds of college and church choir directors from across the state.

REFLECTIONS ON 9/11



This is being written on Sunday afternoon after our Rector delivered a very good sermon about our need to believe in something bigger than ourselves. He used the story of Joseph and his scheming brothers to illustrate how God has a way of making his plan known to us. He also told us of Peter's faith beginning

to wane when he stepped out of the boat to walk on water toward Jesus. I am convinced that the events of the past several years in planning for a new church facility were set in motion by Him and that we need to faithfully follow where He leads us.

In 2003 a committee of the Vestry under the leadership of Sally Cotner looked for and found the property on Henderson Street. With much encouragement from diocesan and local church leadership, our church went into debt to purchase the property. It was a very nice piece of land for which we paid \$274,000. The work of the Building Planning Committee led us to understand that the Henderson Street property, while beautiful, was not configured to execute the best business solution to our need for a new church structure. The property was put up for sale. Time passed without any interested buyers. Then the County became interested in the Henderson Street property as an addition to the long-term drainage and parks plans of the County. With the County's purchase of the Henderson Street property in December 2010, our Building Fund balance increased to \$553,000.

While all of this was going on, the Vestry was actively looking for an appropriate site for a new church. In June of 2009, Larry Heidt initiated a call to the owner of the property on Enterprise Street near the Post Office. The thought was to offer to trade the Henderson Street property. That was not to be, but the door was opened to negotiate if we could sell the Henderson Street acreage. Six months later, the County bought the Henderson Street property and we were ready to negotiate. The new property could be bought for its current tax assessed value of \$501,000, well under the amount we had in the bank!!

It was then time for the Diocese to enter the picture and for the infusion of lawyers and businessmen to the process. Everyone here at home and at the Diocese in San Antonio were in agreement that this would be a good move. However there were surveys, environmental studies, legal contracts, and other roadblocks. This went on for over six months and the owner (seller), who is an elderly gentleman, wanted to see a church on the property. So he offered to sell the property in an "as is" state for \$395,000. (\$106,000 less than the tax assessed value.) The Vestry calculated that the "as is" cost would be no more than two or three thousand dollars, and accepted his offer.

The offer was accepted, the Diocese agreed and, as of this writing, we are awaiting the closing of the sale for this property. Once completed, we will own a very appropriate



Most of us remember hearing the news that a plane had flown into one of the towers at the World Trade Center. Minutes later a second plane struck the other tower and at once we realized, "This was no accident". A third plane hits the Pentagon and the collective gasp across the nation affirms that, "We are under attack!" What's next? Where is our family? Where are our friends? Could they be in harm's way? Who could do such a thing, and why? Then came the news of a fourth hijacked plane crashing into a field near Shanksville, PA. Having heard the news about the other flights, the 40 ordinary passengers on this plane responded in a manner that could preserve as many lives as possible, even at the cost of their own lives. . .

As the morning continued, we heard more stories of heroic response. In the midst of chaos and uncertainty, people choosing to risk everything to save the lives of others. . . These first responders offered something more than heroic service, they were a beacon of light in the midst of a dark uncertain world. What an incredible image of humankind at its best, the initial response to these acts of terror were acts of generosity and care.

It is hard for me to forget the collective efforts of people serving beyond self on that day. Now ten years later, I long for expressions of a beacon of light in the midst of darkness. Stories of people coming together to serve something or someone beyond the self areas important today as they were on that crisp clear September morning ten years ago. We could use the spirit of those first responders again. They were unable to solve every problem on that day, but their collective tenacious efforts were expressions of hope and love. Such vivid expressions can see the human family through dark and difficult times. They are the best that humankind has to offer and their memory reminds us of what we have to offer with each new day.

piece of ground, centrally located to support the ongoing ministries of this parish well into the future. In addition, we will still have something near \$150,000 in the Building Fund. Our next step will require the same thoughtful and prayerful discernment that has brought us to this point. No doubt it will be a step out of the boat, in faith. Gathering the resources necessary to build a facility for our ministries may be a challenge for St. Peter's. We, however, are not simply interested in a nice larger building where we gather for worship. We desire space and place that will allow this faith community to effectively engage in ministry opportunities, both present and future. We desire to genuinely honor God in everything that we build. The foundation of St. Peter's set in place some 140 years ago to meet the needs of that broader community is the same foundation of our parish today. We will continue to build upon that good work in all that comes next. There will always be challenge, but we can do it, with God's help.

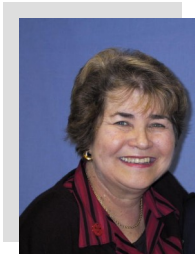
We were deeply saddened to hear of the passing of our dear friend and parishioner, Charlotte Hilton on August 4.

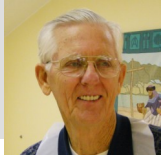

Each Christmas season Good Samaritan provides a box of food to 450-500 families for their holiday dinner. This requires preparation in October and November to collect 30,000 pounds of food for the mid-December event. We will be purchasing 600 small hams from HEB. Many volunteers from Good Sam, winter Texans and the community help us to get ready.

The month of **October** will be the time when we at St. Peter's have an opportunity to donate non-perishable food items to Good Sam. Baskets will be located in the parish hall during October for our donations. You may also bring the food directly to the Good Samaritan office at 507 S. Ann St. (near City Hall). Envelopes for monetary donations may be found by the baskets or may be mailed to Good Sam. Monies collected will be used to purchase food from HEB and the Food Bank.

COMMUNITY TABLE

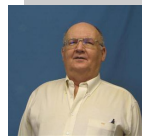

It was a privilege.

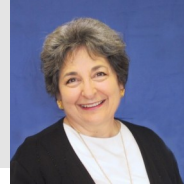
